Why do we have a movement?

- An era of increased accountability

Campus Community Collaboration

- Led by the Governor-General of Canada
- Members include AUCC, Research granting bodies and key charitable organisations
- The overall goal of the CCCI is to increase the capacity of Canadian communities to develop and implement innovative and sustainable solutions to address the variety of complex challenges that face them by linking more effectively to the resources and expertise of postsecondary institutions.
